

These efforts have enabled Montebello to develop a strategic plan to resume in-person operations in accordance with federal and state public health orders.

#### PHASE I - IN EFFECT NOW

#### Parks & Amenities

Restrooms, playgrounds, the skate park, tennis/pickleball courts, basketball courts, volleyball courts, handball courts, BBQ pits, picnic shelters are open to the public with hourly restrictions, limitations, & safety protocols in place.

#### **Youth Sport Permits**

Outdoor practice, training, and fitness allowed with safety protocols in place. Los Angeles County Department of Public Health requires an online form for proposed events or competitions between more than two teams or multiple individual competitors.

#### Montebello Bus Lines

Bus occupancy increased to 55%. Masks required for all riders.

#### PHASE II - June 21, 2021

#### City Hall Access

Open to the public with occupancy limitations. Temperature screening, face masks, and physical distancing still required for entry. Public must check-in at north-side entrance tent.

#### **Outdoor Activities**

Organized recreational activities and classes that can be conducted outdoors, with six feet of physical distancing and within groups, are permitted. Picnic shelters available to rent.

#### Montebello Bus Lines

Bus occupancy increased to 65%. Masks required for all riders.

#### PHASE III - August 2, 2021

#### Council Chambers

Fully open to the public with physical distancing and max occupancy of 27 people, including councilmembers. Temperature screening and masks required for entry.

#### Commission Meetings

Fully open to the public with physical distancing and max occupancy of 27 people, including commissioners. Temperature screening and masks required for entry.

#### Indoor Park Facilities

Facilities and meeting spaces available for rent with physical distancing and occupancy limitations based on public health guidelines.

#### Montebello Bus Lines

Bus occupancy increased to 75%. Masks required for all riders.

# MONTEBELLO CORRIDOR GRADE SEPARATION PROJECTS



The Montebello Corridor Grade Separation Project is comprised of three separate components which impact four current street level crossings with the Union Pacific Railroad (UPRR) within the City of Montebello.

Montebello Boulevard Grade Separation Project: Construction of a bridge at the UPRR crossing at Montebello Boulevard and at Olympic Boulevard, creating a roadway underpass at both.

At-Grade Safety Improvements: Upgrades to the signals at the Greenwood Avenue and Vail Avenue crossings and installation of medians to prevent vehicle drive-arounds. It also includes pedestrian crossing safety enhancement measures

Maple Avenue Pedestrian Bridge: A pedestrian bridge will be constructed over the UPRR right-of-way at Maple Avenue.

The Montebello Boulevard Grade Separation Project and the At-Grade Safety Improvements are in the final engineering and design phase. A construction contract is anticipated to be awarded in early winter 2021-2022 and construction is scheduled to begin late winter 2022 and be completed and opened to traffic by summer 2025. The Maple Avenue Pedestrian Bridge is at 35% design pending availability of construction phase funding. It is anticipated to begin construction in summer 2023 and be completed by summer 2025. The overall estimated project cost is \$208.5 million.

#### **Project Benefits**

These projects will eliminate crossing collisions, queuing and congestion, and reduce vehicle emissions. An average of 49 trains per day traverse Montebello and 10 collisions have been recorded at Montebello's crossings, resulting in three fatalities and two injuries. Without these improvements, growing train and vehicle traffic will result in an approximate doubling of vehicle-hours of delay at the busiest crossing, Montebello Boulevard, which carries an average of 21,000 vehicles a day.

### BE SAFE THIS JULY 4TH

Did you know fireworks caused an estimated 10,000 injuries treated in U.S. hospital emergency departments during calendar year 2019? According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, children under 4 years had the highest number of injuries. The Montebello Fire Department encourages everyone and their families to be aware of the following firework safety tips this July  $4^{\text{th}}$  holiday:

- Safe and Sane approved fireworks are only allowed on July 4<sup>th</sup> from 12 noon 10 p.m.
- Always have an adult present.
- Use fireworks outdoors only.
- Never use near dry grass or other flammable materials.
- Keep a safe distance & light only one at a time.
- Never point or throw fireworks at another person.
- Never experiment with or "fix" fireworks.
- Have a bucket of water and a hose handy.

Montebello Police will be enforcing firework laws during the 4<sup>th</sup> of July. Violators may face a \$1,000 fine or possible arrest. Fireworks are not allowed in the City before or after the 4th of July.

#### DRINKING + DRIVING = DEADLY COMBO



As summer approaches and COVID-19 restrictions become less restrictive, more people will be driving to enjoy weekends in the park, family gatherings and dining out. With more commuters and vehicles on our roads it's important to remember your responsibilities as a driver.

Everyday approximately 28 people in the United States die in drunk driving accidents. That's one death nearly every hour. Driving while impaired should be avoided by following the simple philosophy of "Don't Drink and Drive." If you have to ask if you had too many drinks to drive, then you probably have. Don't take a chance; there are many other options to get home safe, like ride sharing.

Distracted driving has become another significant killer on our roadways. Thousands of people die every year in this country from this preventable tragedy. According to the Highway Traffic Safety Administration, texting is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading a text message can take your eyes off of the road for nearly five seconds. At 55 MPH, this is like driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed. Drunk driving and distracted driving increase your chances of being involved in a traffic collision that can cause death or serious injuries. Be responsible. Please don't drink and drive, don't text and drive and don't combine the two. The life you save may be yours or someone dear.

The Montebello Police Department encourages responsible social gatherings where everyone gets to and from safe and alive.

Hello Montebello Residents,

As Director of Transportation, it is an honor to serve community members, visitors, and residents of the great City of Montebello. A tremendous responsibility here at Montebello Bus Lines (MBL) is to maintain and provide a reliable, fast, and safe public transportation system for all riders to and from neighboring cities, ranging from the San Gabriel Valley to the Gateway Cities. Every single MBL employee is committed to this mission.

As we transition into the "yellow" tier of COVID-19 public health guidelines, MBL is busy planning bus schedule changes to take effect July 5, 2021. As of May 17, MBL's bus capacity is at 55% (30 passengers per bus) and will increase to 65% by June and 75% by July 2021. MBL expects to return to full service in order to meet the high demand of ridership by fall of 2021. COVID-19 safety measures will include the continuation of thorough cleaning, face cover requirements, and physical-distancing as capacity permits. These measures will continue to ensure the safety and health of all riders and employees.

As you plan your day to travel for work, school, personal appointments – or just for fun – consider riding MBL and think ahead. You'll spend less time behind the wheel, help reduce traffic, and improve air quality. We are here to serve the community and find ways to improve our service.

#### WHITTIER NARROWS DAM REFURBISHMENT UPDATE

Whittier Narrows Dam and Reservoir is a flood control and water conservation project constructed and operated by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), Los Angeles District at the Whittier Narrows in Montebello, California. Whittier Narrows Dam is a central element of the Los Angeles County Drainage Area (LACDA) flood control system which serves to collect runoff from uncontrolled drainage areas upstream as well as releases into the San Gabriel River. The USACE has determined, through a Dam Safety Modification Study, that this dam poses a potentially high risk to the working-class communities along Southern California's San Gabriel River floodplain if a mega storm were to hit the area. An estimated one million people live and work along the floodplain.

Despite the slim chance of a mega storm, the USACE is taking necessary precautions to prepare for such an event. The dam will undergo a refurbishment at a cost of \$500 to \$600 million in Federal funding beginning in 2021.

City Plans: While the potential impact of construction to Montebello residents is low, the City will work with the USACE to inform residents on updates regarding the Whittier Narrows Dam Project. # LOCAL HOTELS BENEFIT THE COMMUNITY

The City of Montebello owns two hotels, the Hilton Garden Inn and the Home2Suites by Hilton. They are located adjacent to the Montebello Golf Course and close to many tourist and business destinations. Both hotels are self-sustaining at no cost to the public.

#### Here's How:

Bonds were issued to construct the hotels. Similar to how a home mortgage loan works, the bonds are paid down over a period of time until they are completely paid off (approximately 20 years). The hotels generate profits, and that income is utilized to support hotel operations through a "waterfall effect."




Here's what it looks like:

City issues a bond to build the hotels. As the hotels generate income, their profits flow down.

First, income from the hotel goes back to repaying the
